1. Teachers should place the deliberate inclusion of students with special needs, resulting from diverse cultural, language, or disabilities, high within the priorities. I have discovered that within a class of students a menagerie of gifts, struggles, quarks, and needs exist. Teachers must know their students and consider this diversity if they desire to accommodate for them in a effective manner. Considering IEP goals and the students themselves, I will adapt lesson plans and create a classroom environment beneficial for instructing students with special needs, in order to ensure the inclusion and overall learning of such students.

First and foremost, teachers need to have a loving mentality for these students just as they have for those students without disabilities, caring for them and desiring their growth. General education teachers must "have high expectations for student achievement" although these students might have specific needs or IEP goals (Jorgensen, Notes). Lesson plans would be adapted to give more differentiated instruction in order to benefit a variety of student needs. However, in regards to students with specific IEP goals or adaptation needs, I will alter my lesson plans further to include options to provide growth for such specific cases. I desire to match the needs of each student, whether that be academic or other. Some IEP goals require teachers to address life skills, rather than academic learning, so that students can reach an independence in society. I know that to ensure that I stay committed to these students, I must

participate in the writing of such goals, converse frequently with families, and also tailor my lessons to fit a diverse classroom.

The classroom environment most suitable for successful inclusion follows the pattern of Romans 12:10: "Be devoted to one another in brotherly love. Honor one another above yourselves." This would be a respectful, Least Restrictive Environment for the student, giving the student their right to a general education classroom whenever possible. Special education should "foster equity and access to all aspects of society" (Notes). My classroom must be set up in such a way that does not hinder students from participating, specifically if they have physical disabilities. This should be considered in order "to be devoted" to these students, as it says in Romans 12.

Only with effective pedagogical methods can a teacher help their students really grow academically. However, a lot of nonacademic areas must be considered for the teacher to really connect with her students. I saw the reality of these situations and grew from them in my field experiences with students from other cultures or students with disabilities. Just as with all their students, teachers should approach these students with love and respect, in order to establish a relationship that will foster growth and effective implementation of pedagogical methods in light of IEPs. With the students' interest at heart, teachers will learn to approach these situations through experience and God-given strength.
