Gender Roles and Expectations

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- 1. We want to explore the perceived norms and expectations that individuals have towards members of the opposite sex in a relationship. These perceived norms and expectations are interpreted as which gender should ask the other person out, who should pay, etc. Those relationships could include dating a single individual, dating multiple people, or not dating at all. Our targets for study will be individuals of all ages both in and not in a relationship at Concordia University, Nebraska. This research will allow people to know and understand what is expected in the relationship by both genders. We believe this information is important because it will give people a greater understanding of what the individual of the opposite gender is looking for. This information can be used for personal use in an individual's social life. In our project we used the research method of surveys, 125, and with a subset of interviews, 10.
- 2. In the beginning we had to figure out what our topic was going to be. As a group we thought that the roles and expectations of genders at the college age would be interesting and that the data would be easy to collect as well as yield interesting results. We wanted to figure out who should pay, open doors, who should initiate the date, etc. Then for our second step we did some research on articles that related to dating. We found 2 primary articles that talked about the expectations of dating for both men and women as well as information on how the researchers had conducted their research. After reading the articles we wrote out a summary about what each article stated to better understand the correlation between the articles and our topic. We used the information that we got from the articles to figure out what we would like to ask the college students and what we would like to know overall. The next step was to make up our survey and interview. We had a few problems developing the questions for the survey and interview. We also had a hard time getting the information from the survey to match with the interview or vice versa. We eventually complete our survey and interview questions, and then we

b. Male Survey Data

Sixty-two males, ages 17-25, were surveyed in total. The surveys were given out in various locations around campus to ensure randomness. The data was skewed a bit towards freshman, who made up about half (32) of the total sampled. An equal number of juniors (11) and sophomores (12) were sampled however with seniors (7) not too far behind. Of these samples about half were single (32) however 16 of them reported they were on the market, actively searching for a relationship. Almost half of the remaining total were found to be in a relationship (27) with only 6 of those 27 reporting they were in a long-distance relationship. In the 4 remaining surveys 3 reported they were engaged while only 1 was married. It was also recorded that 17 of the males surveyed had been in no relationships, while about half (32) had been in one relationship in college, 8 had been in 2 relationships, 4 in 3 relationships, and only 1 had been in 4 or more relationships.

Moving on to the multiple-choice part of the survey which consisted of two questions, the first dealing with the role of a man paying for dates and the second how much time was considered healthy to spend together as a couple, the responses varied. For the first question 9 males said the man never pays, while 20 reported that the man always pays, double the number of those who said a man never pays. 14 males said they would pay for the first few dates but by

relationship should be able to anticipate the other's needs. The majority (34) agreed, while 14 disagreed, 10 strongly agreed, 0 strongly disagreed, and 4 didn't know.

Female Survey Data

Sixty-three females, ages 17-25, were surveyed in total. The surveys were given out in various locations around campus to ensure randomness. The data was fairly even, with freshman making up 18 of the total sampled. An equal number of juniors (16) and sophomores (17) were sampled however with seniors (12) not too far behind. Of these samples about half were single (35) with only 6 reporting they were on the market, actively searching for a relationship. Almost half of the remaining total were found to be in a relationship (19) with only 1 of those 19 reporting they were in a long-distance relationship. In the 4 remaining surveys 4 reported they were engaged while none were married. It was also recorded that 19 of the females surveyed had been in no relationships, while a little less than half (22) had been in one relationship in college, 15 had been in 2 relationships, 4 in 3 relationships, and 3 had been in 4 or more relationships.

Moving on to the multiple-choice part of the survey which consisted of two questions, the first dealing with the role of a man paying for dates and the second how much time was considered healthy to spend together as a couple, the responses varied. For the first question 3 females said the man never pays, while 24 reported that the man always pays, significantly larger than number of those who said a man never pays. 14 females said males should pay for the first few dates but by date number 3 it was no longer the man's responsibility and 1 female said the same thing but held off until date number 15. A surprising 21 checked other and the majority wrote that the bill should be split in some way, either each person paying half or one person paying one time and the other the next. In the second question the majority (26) reported they

Five males, ages ranging from 18-21 were interviewed and asked a total of 9 questions. The first question asked for their current relationship status, 1 reported single, 1 on the market, and 3 in a relationship. The second asked what year in school they were, 1 reported freshman, 2 sophomores, and 2 juniors, no seniors were interviewed. The third question asked for the total amount of relationships in college, 0 reported 0, 1 reported 1, 1 reported 2, and 3 reported 3 or more. The fourth and fifth questions asked the males to list roles of men and women in a relationship. Roles of a man included provider, protector, respectful, sacrificing time, support, and love. Roles of a women included advisor, comforter, support, receiver, caretaker, stability, and love. The sixth and seventh questions asked what was seen as an appropriate amount of affection for a man/ women to show on the 3rd date and then on the 10th date. The males said other males, could possibly kiss, hold hands(2), hug, kiss and refrain from PDA on the 3rd date while on the 10th date more physical contact was ok, hug (2), possibly kiss, and kiss (2). Men reported that women should show same as man show her, hold hands (2), hug, be held to the same standards as a man (2) and flirt on the 3rd date, while on the 10th date kiss (2), massage, hold hands, hug, should show same as man show her, and be held to the same standards as a man (2). The eighth question asked for top three qualities, attractiveness and faith were both mentioned twice, while kindness, good personality, sense of humor, loving, good communication, artistic were all mentioned once. The last question asked the males to recite a script of how they would go about preparing and going on a first date. Two reported they would ask out, 1 plan date, 5 mentioned getting ready, 1 clean car, 4 said they would pick the girl up, 2 said they would pay for the date, 2 walk to door, 2 no kiss, and 1 said be funny.

- c. From this wealth of research I think overall this research team learned that we are in a traditional environment for the time we exist in, where males and females hold themselves and are held to traditional role expectations. Faith is very important to both genders, as well as the expectation for a serious and honest relationship. Specifically the results were extremely interesting to compare. All of the questions confirmed the overall theme of tradition but there were a few questions that lead to interesting confirmations of gender difference. There were two questions on the survey specifically and one on the interview. The fourth question on the survey which asked how much time was appropriate for a couple to spend together revealed that women as a whole prefer to spend a majority of their time with their significant other while men prefer to spend less than half their time with their significant other. The other survey question was number 6 where men and women reported their top three qualities. Men reported attractiveness as their number one while women reported honesty, these results are confirmed in the interviews as well, and these results are very telling of the gender differences between men and women. The question on the interview which is significant is numbers six and seven which reported the appropriate amount of affection for females and males to show at different times in their relationship. Men actually expected less physical affection on the first date than women but the women expected and were expected to follow the man's lead. This could lead to some very confusing ends to first dates. Altogether the data collected in this research assignment is valuable and some of the questions are worthy of further in-depth study.
- 6. The things that worked well were the articles in the beginning of this research project. The articles gave us some good ideas to what needs to be asked and what is important. The surveys and interview questions were very direct. Everyone who did the survey or interview understood

When doing this research we learned it is good to assign parts of the research to everyone and make it clear everyone had to turn it in. I do think there were and always be the "leaders" of the group that assign what is do, collect everything, and fix assignments that will be adjusted. This research definitely has to stay organized at all times. Once something is missed place or not turned in your research can be messed up. Also, when collecting the data it is important to stay cautious to get all age groups. That way the information toward the end won't sway in one particular age. Having the different steps in this research was a good idea because it worked us up to the big part of the project which is getting the research and the final conclusion. The steps also made us concentrate on our topic and figure out what information is important to get us the results we would like at the end of the project.

7. Our expectations for our research were that the students of Concordia University, Nebraska would have a more traditional view on relationship roles. For example, the man would be the protector, provider, and demonstrate chivalry while the woman would be the comforter and caretaker. Another view we expected would be that the men would direct or initiate and the women would respond. Generally we discovered with our research that this was the case for the sample we studied. In our survey both men and women agreed that the boyfriend should open doors and carry things for his girl friend and in the interviews the common descriptions for the role of the male were initiator, provider, and security/protector. The common descriptions of roles for women in the survey were respectful, loving, comforter, nurturing, and supporting. However, we noticed in the interviews that each gender viewed the other to have more traditional qualities. For women qualities like cooking and cleaning and encouraging were used to describe their role according to men. Where the ideal role of men in the view of the women interviewed included traits like a leader, decision maker, and paying for meals. In the surveys there seemed to

However, when collecting the surveys we discovered that rather than having a large variety of the Concordia University, Seward population in regards to an even sample of each class, it was mainly a study of the freshman and sophomores of the Concordia University, Seward Campus. When analyzing the survey we became curious as to how honest the recipients were. Were they answering truthfully or are they answering these questions on how they perceive themselves and not fully on their actions.

9. This study put into perspective how much time and effort it takes to perform a well-planned research project. Research takes much time to collect the data, and even more time to analyze and organize the data. Overall, it was a successful effort for our group to collect, analyze, and organize the data we collected, but with more group synergy, we could have collected more data from across campus, as well as analyze and organize more quickly and efficiently.
