Course description

In this course you will learn how music from European and American traditions is put together. Most concert music and jazz, and nearly all popular and church music, makes use of the theory you will study this year. Learning methods include drill, analysis (looking at or listening to music and figuring out how it works) and composition (writing your own music).

Attendance policy

Your grade for the assignment will be the average of the original grade and the grade with corrections. Late homework puts you behind and inconveniences me. To discourage this, late homework will not be eligible for regrading. All late homework must be submitted no later than the next following exam.

If you are absent (whether or not you have informed me in advance), you are still responsible for material covered during class and for any assigned homework. To avoid penalties, you should submit completed homework on the day it is due, preferably by giving it to a classmate to bring to class.
