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- A: Appropriate identification means a source person is identified by proper name, title, date and location of interview, and connection to the story; or that source facts are identified by date and location of occurrence, and by listing of the publication/persons who originally reported them.
- B: Credible means the source facts are empirically verifiable or otherwise able to be credibly verified.

or that a person quoted in the story has a verifiable connection and expertise with the topic. All relevant sides <u>means</u> information necessary to understand the topic's effects on the full range of people involved in or impacted by the story.

- C: Accurate presentation means that any quotes are verbatim (and ideally can be verified through notes or recordings), or that information presented as fact can be verified through comparison with other sources. It also means that all paraphrases or factual references accurately reflect the original quotes or sources of the facts.
- D: Appropriate precision means that the sources have expertise or connections to the topic that are appropriate for the story.
- E: The story appropriately explains the information from each source, but also explains how all of the

information collectively relates to the overall topic, so readers have the full context of the story.
